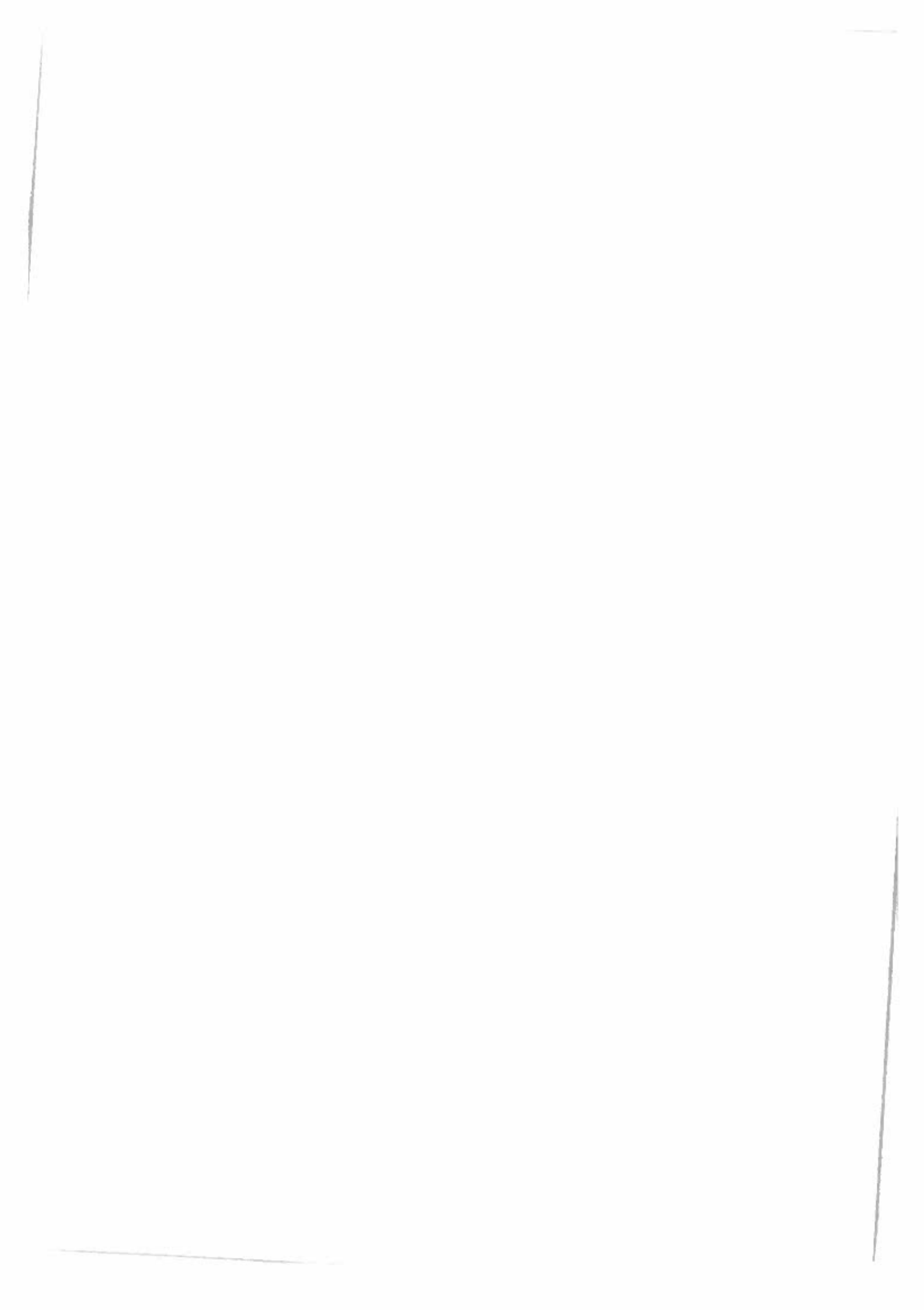

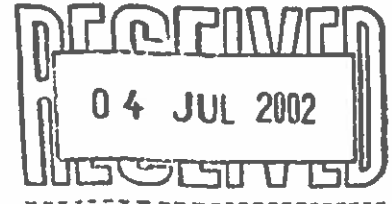

Introduction

This report is based on one interview with Mr Thomson in HMP Barlinnie, where he was remanded and one interview at Dumbarton Sheriff Court, where he was appearing on other matters. Reference has been made to Unit records, Ms [REDACTED] of Includem, and Ms Marion Corcoran, Social Worker, Children and Families Team. The writer has also consulted [REDACTED] Community Service Officer and Mr [REDACTED] of Airborne Initiative.

Mr Thomson is due to appear for trial in Glasgow District Court on 25 July on shoplifting charges, and for sentencing for breaching his current Probation Order in Dumbarton Sheriff Court on 26 July. He is remanded until then. He may have one other outstanding trial matter in Dumbarton Sheriff Court

Current Circumstances

Mr Thomson was residing on a temporary basis in Bed and Breakfast accommodation at the above address. He resided here for about 2 months. Were he to be at liberty this week a placement would again be obtained for him at this establishment. Mr Thomson has spent all but three weeks in the past 18 months in different bed and breakfast establishments. He has been unable to sustain a placement in any bed and breakfast establishment or supported accommodation. There are ongoing negotiations between East Dunbartonshire Council Social Services and Housing Services about appropriate accommodation for Mr Thomson in the future. East Dunbartonshire Housing Services have, until Mr Thomson turned 18 last month, seen responsibility for accommodating Mr Thomson as lying with Social Services.

Family Background

Mr Thomson's mother hails from South Lanarkshire and his father, [REDACTED], from Greece. They were living in Lesmahagow when Mr Thomson was born in Bellshill, the only child of this union. The family went to live in Greece the following year, but the marriage broke down in 1986 and [REDACTED] returned to Scotland with her son. She moved to live in Crow Road, Glasgow in 1987, staying here for 4 years. By this time she had met [REDACTED]. They married in 1991 and moved to London, where his half-brothers were born. Mr Thomson is said to have regarded his stepfather as his real father. [REDACTED] appears to have suffered some form of [REDACTED] around 1996 - 1997. She separated from [REDACTED] and in late 1996 returned to Scotland to live with the children. After a reconciliation, the family moved back to London, but the marital relationship continued to be unstable. [REDACTED] came back to Scotland to live in late 1997 with the three younger children settling in Kirkintilloch. They separated again in 2000, and last year, Mr Thomson returned to London to live.

[REDACTED] assisted her son to trace his natural father in France in 2000, and he has since spent two holidays with his natural father. Mr Thomson at one time seemed to have hopes of starting a new life with his father, but these did not come to fruition. Despite the difficulties in his relationship with his family, Mr Thomson remains attached to them all. He offered his mother support when his grandmother died last year, and was clearly distressed when his mother had to have a serious operation earlier this year.

Personal History, including Employment

Mr Thomson was born by caesarean section, but did not experience any developmental problems as he was growing up. Records indicate that his mother has described him as being an "idiot" from the age of 2 and it would seem she had some difficulties managing him before he went to school. He began his education in Glasgow, and after moving to London (Thamesmead Estate), he attended a further two primary schools. He was generally described as being disruptive in class and disrespectful to adults. These problems continued after he transferred to secondary schooling in 1995. In March 1997, after his mother indicated she could not control him, he was placed with various foster carers and residential placements in a short space of time. Specific concerns raised about Mr Thomson over this period included his tendency to abscond overnight or for weeks at a time. He was reported as aggressive and abusive, and displaying sexualised behaviour. Mr Thomson remained in Orchard Lodge, an assessment centre, after the rest of the family moved back to Scotland in late 1997.

In August 1998, Mr Thomson moved to Scotland under a supervision requirement. He was immediately placed at Springboig St John's a 'List G' school, since his emotional and behavioural difficulties precluded mainstream schooling. However, by March 1999, a secure placement was felt necessary and he was subsequently placed at Kenmure St Mary's, Bishopbriggs. In September 1999, he moved to a semi-secure unit, staying there under a supervision requirement until his leaving date in July 2000. The same concerns continued to trouble those caring for him, and were added to by escalating involvement in alleged offending. Mr Thomson did not achieve any exam passes, but did have positive work experience prior to leaving school.

Mr Thomson recently undertook a general work skills training placement with the Millenium Project (Tomorrow's People) in Maryhill. This programme lasted from December 2001 until April 2002, and Mr Thomson successfully completed it.

Health and Addictions

Mr Thomson states he is generally in reasonable physical health and that he does not experience any mental health problems. However, it should be noted that he self-harmed while in Police custody in February this year. As noted, records suggest he has displayed emotional and behavioural difficulties throughout his childhood. He has been previously been subject to various assessments which suggest his psychological difficulties are linked to his problematic family relationships.

Mr Thomson has been drinking alcohol regularly for some years. At times he successfully exerts control over his consumption. At other times, e.g. when there are particular difficulties in his relationship with his mother, or when he feels helpless to manage his situation, Mr Thomson tends to drink to excess and seems to court conflict. He agrees he would not be in his current situation were it not for his pattern of alcohol use. Mr Thomson has seemed increasingly aware of the consequences to himself of his drinking, and recently asked to be re-referred to East Dunbartonshire Addictions Service for support. Illegal substance use does not seem to pose the same order of difficulty.

Attitude to Offence and Offending

Mr Thomson's attitude to the driving offences (2000) has been previously reported. The other libelled offences, occurring in January and February this year, are not of the same order. They were also committed when Mr Thomson was out of planned contact with Includem and the writer.

Mr Thomson admits he had drunk to excess before becoming involved in both incidents. Mr Thomson's formative years were spent in multicultural community in South London, and he is very aware of his own mixed cultural heritage. He has previously expressed his disgust at racist behaviour and has appeared mortified to be deemed to have committed racially aggravated offences.

Mr Thomson committed the second set of offences during a period when his mother was suffering significant health problems. It should be noted that he not only assaulted police Officers and damaged Police property, but also slashed himself. It is the writer's belief that Mr Thomson reached his nadir at this point: he certainly appeared ashamed of his behaviour and he subsequently began to acknowledge the damage that alcohol was causing to his life as well as to other people.

Probation Progress

Mr Thomson was still subject to a Children's Panel supervision requirement when he was placed on Probation, and appropriate services were already in place to meet his needs as they were assessed at this stage. Additional intensive support was provided from April 2001 from Includem. The supervision requirement was terminated on 29 January this year.

Mr Thomson was placed on Probation for car theft and driving offences for 18 months by Kilmarnock Sheriff Court on 26 February 2001. An additional requirement of the order was for Mr Thomson to pay £250-00 compensation. The order was transferred to Dumbarton Sheriff Court since Mr Thomson was living in Milngavie at the time.

Mr Thomson failed to pay compensation as required: six months into the order, the Sheriff Clerk at Dunbarton advised that Mr Thomson had made one payment of £10-00, leaving a balance of £240-00. A Breach report was accordingly submitted. He has made no subsequent effort to reduce this balance.

Mr Thomson subsequently reoffended during the Probation period by committing some of the libelled offences. The writer believes there is one further trial to be concluded in Dumbarton Sheriff Court.

Mr Thomson was in minimal contact with the agencies attempting to assist him, except the Millenium Project, during January and February this year. He also reused to divulge his address. He did not renew direct contact with the writer until late April 2002. Weekly contact was then agreed, and it should be noted Mr Thomson cooperated with this agreement until he was remanded. During this period, Mr Thomson reviewed his circumstances and needs with the writer and it was concluded he would be unable to address his needs in a planned way until he faced up to his outstanding warrants. As noted, Mr Thomson requested a re-referral for alcohol counselling from East Dunbartonshire Addictions Service: this was the first time

such a request has come from him and would indicate increased maturity. Mr Thomson has indicated he wishes and will cooperate with the continuing support of Includem and the writer.

Risk Assessment

Mr Thomson continues to present as at high risk of reoffending and low risk of causing harm. Criminogenic needs identified as requiring attention if offending is to stop include alcohol misuse, unstable family and peer relationships, and accommodation, limited impulse/anger control, lack of constructive activity and budgeting skills.

Summary

Mr Thomson has experienced a disrupted upbringing due to unstable family relationships and geographical moves. He was accommodated by local authorities from 1997 until 2000. He is currently unemployed and in Bed and Breakfast accommodation. He is currently assessed as at high risk of reoffending and low risk of causing harm.

Custody

Mr Thomson is experiencing remand for the first time. He says he is finding it unpleasant, mainly from the point of view of not having his freedom. He appears to be coping with the regime, and advises that he is attempting to keep a low profile to avoid involving himself in trouble. This is unlike Mr Thomson, who is generally very gregarious and has a low boredom threshold: again it may suggest increasing maturity.

Community Service Assessment

Mr Thomson is suitable for Community Service, and indicates he will consent to the conditions of such an Order as a direct alternative to custody. The Community Service Officer confirmed there is a place available on the local scheme. Given Mr Thomson's current accommodation situation and other needs, it is the Community Service Officer's advice that a disposal addressing these needs may be more viable at this time. Otherwise, a shorter Order may be felt appropriate.

Probation Assessment

Mr Thomson breached his current Probation Order by failing to pay compensation: he will be sentenced on this on 26 July by Dumbarton Sheriff Court. He also withdrew his cooperation with the writer and other helping agencies in January and February this year, when he reoffended as noted. However, he subsequently demonstrated a willingness to re-engage in planned work, and admits he needs help if he is to resolve his problems, avoid re-offending and further punishment.

Given Mr Thomson's needs, the writer is of the opinion that he requires intensive structured programmes to impact on his behaviour. He responded well to the structure of the "Tomorrow's People" programme, and sought renewed supervision from Includem and the writer when the programme finished. The writer referred him for assessment to Airborne Initiative, which provides a 9 week residential programme focussing on offending behaviour,

life skills and constructive activity. Although Mr Drew Graham advises that he seems suitable for this Project, since he is now remanded until 26 July, he will not be at liberty to take up a place on the course commencing on 24 July. If he is at liberty and subject to a Probation Order requiring him to attend, a place is available on the course starting on 16 October this year.

The writer also considered referring him for a placement at Dick Stewart Probation Hostel, where he would be provided with offence focussed programmes as well as supervision. Unfortunately, there is currently a waiting list for places, and there is no guarantee of when a placement would become available. This option will nevertheless be pursued.

Should the Court wish to consider imposing a further Probation Order in relation to the libelled offences, the writer would suggest an additional condition be attached requiring Mr Thomson to attend Airborne Initiative. He would be expected to attend East Dunbartonshire Addictions Service for assistance in relation to his alcohol misuse, and efforts would continue to assist him obtain more stable accommodation. Mr Thomson indicated he would comply with any additional conditions attached to a new Order.

Conclusion

Mr Thomson is remanded until 26 July by Dumbarton Sheriff Court. The writer believes that, due to Mr Thomson's changed attitude towards supervision in the past couple of months, a community based disposal could be viable at this time. A Probation Order is available with additional conditions which would represent a direct alternative to custody, as outlined above.

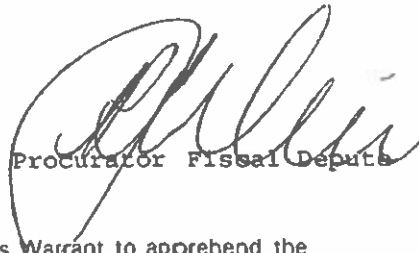

Offending

Includem

Includem is an offence-focused project, which works with 15-18 year old offenders / chaotic young people. Programmes of work are individually tailored and delivered via a high frequency level of contact and included access to the 24 hour, 7 day a week Helpline.

Includem's objectives include promoting safer communities by developing supportive but challenging relationships, enabling young people to examine the attitudes, values and beliefs that inform offending behaviour, whilst addressing contributory factors such as health, housing, education and employment.

Referral

David was introduced to Includem on 27th April 2001 following a decision made by Marion Corcoran, David's social worker, that David required additional assistance to aid him to address the lifestyle and practical issues which have directly contributed to his offending behaviour.

Level of Contact

Contact was established and David and I maintained a high frequency of contact (4-6 times a week, including weekends and evenings). David co-operated fully and has developed an open relationship with myself. At the beginning of June 2001 David began regular weekly contact with an Includem mentor and this also proved to be a positive relationship. On the 6th August 2001, at David's support planning meeting it was agreed the contact would be reduced to 4 Includem contacts a week due to David's progress and the reduction in offending behaviour.

Response to Contact

David has responded very well to the workers and Includem's approach and has worked hard at addressing the more chaotic variables in his lifestyle. He has participated in a lot of structured, formal work addressing his offending behaviour. His awareness of the contributory factors has increased over the 5 months he has been working with Includem.

Given the circumstances described, it has not been possible to complete the requested reports.

- 1. Accommodation and independent living skills (including employment and budgeting):** initially via David cooperating with services made available to him through his continuing supervision requirement. In the longer term, to explore a possible move to live with his father in France.
- 2. Drug and alcohol misuse:** via education programme being provided by Addictions worker
- 3. Relationship issues and skills, including peer influence and emotional/behavioural management:** David will be provided with support from [REDACTED] to explore these issues from an offending behaviour focus, using cognitive behavioural methods
- 4. Comply with compensation payment (£250):** this is David's responsibility, although he will be provided with appropriate assistance
- 5. Active liaison between CJS and Children and Families workers to ensure David has access to advice/support throughout week on a consistent basis**

PROGRESS TO DATE

1. David's compliance with the Order has not been satisfactory. He is £100-00 in arrears for his Compensation Order, according to the Sheriff Clerk at Dumbarton, making the balance owed £40-00. He has only made one payment therefore to his Compensation Order, although he has claimed to have made more. He will be cited to a Means Court soon. He has not attended appointments with [REDACTED] as directed, and has been issued with a formal warning.

This has improved since May. More recently, he has not attended appointments with Includem and Marion. He has also reported being charged with a new RTA offence.

2. David has been assisted to apply for places in supported accommodation projects, particularly Glengowan in Glasgow, YMCA Cumbernauld and Barnardos 16+.

Unfortunately, he has not managed to obtain a place in any project. His housing situation requires to be reviewed as a priority. His mother is keen for him to make use of the opportunity provided by his father: [REDACTED] would like David to go to France on a trial basis initially, so as to be sure a permanent move is more viable. David is waiting for his passport application to be processed. David has been offered advice and practical support to manage his money, but unfortunately seems unable at present to budget over the fortnightly cycle.

[REDACTED] involvement includes supporting David in terms of these issues.

3. David attended sessions with [REDACTED] of EDAS. This service was terminated since David maintained he does not have any difficulties in terms of his alcohol use, even though it seems linked to his involvement in offending behaviour and some of his unreliability in terms of budgeting, contact with the Department and relationships. Lynsey has tried to pick up some of these issues with David.

4. David has made little progress in terms of addressing his offending behaviour. This was initially addressed with him via [REDACTED], then via [REDACTED]. Progress has been impeded due to David's not keeping appointments. David has apparently made some progress in recent weeks in terms of repairing his relationship with his mother.

CHANGE OF CIRCUMSTANCES

David was asked to leave the Travel Lodge in April due to his behaviour becoming unacceptable to them. Since 25 April he has been placed in the Lion Hotel in Bishopbriggs.

Social Work Department to do the rest of the arrangements.

David has had a girlfriend recently. His social circle is not big at the moment, with much of his time spent with his family.

David seems to be coping better with budgeting but still is unable to prepare food economically, having to rely on carry-outs etc. Marion to consider assistance with bus pass, linked to progress on item below.
