Circumstances in which child received into care:

These children have been "at risk" since their mother deserted the home in June, 1970. Father has since lost his job through drinking excessively and is at present unemployed. He leaves the children unattended for long periods and is suspected of leaving them over the weekends, but this has not been proved.

Complaints made by neighbours about the noise and behaviour of the children in his absence and the fact that they are often without food.

Jacqueline and Samantha received into care 31.3.71.

Date

REPORTS, etc.

25.3.71.

As the result of complaints from neighbours that the children were being left unattended for long periods it was felt necessary to receive these children into care.

The family have been known to the Department for a number of years and there has been a history of marital dispute resulting in the mother leaving home in June of last year. The father since then has not been fulfilling his obligations as a parent and, although fond of the children, he was not attending to their daily needs. Charmaine, the eldest, was on many occasions, left to care for all the family.

31.3.71.

On this date Jacqueline and Samantha were received into care and placed in Carsewood House.

17.4.71.

Phone call from Miss Morrison, Carsewood House, at 9.30 p.m. Mr. Good had taken the children out for the afternoon and had not returned. He told her he had permission from me to have them out overnight. This was not the case and I told Miss Morrison the matter would be looked into.

Phoned Mr. McFie, next-door neighbour of the Goods and he brought Mr. Good in to speak to me. Mr. Good said he was under the impression that he could have them anytime he wanted. He was informed the Homes must have confirmation in advance if children are going to be away overnight.

27.4.71.

Malcolm had been told he was going to stay with Jacqueline and Samantha and he did not appear to mind. He was more interested in going in the car and wanted to know all about it.

Said Cheerio to the girls and took Malcolm to Carsewood House. Met Jacqueline and Samantha when they came in from school. Both girls looked well and happy and were eager to tell me all about their room and what they had been doing. They are both in the Brownies and like it very much. They have settled in at Carsewood and there are no problems at the moment.

IM/BC

23.4.71.

A phone call from Mrs. McPhee, a neighbour of Mr. Good's, asking if he could have the children out for the weekend. Advised her this was in order provided Mr. Good brought the children back at the time stated.

30.4.71.

Mrs. Good phoned me at the Family Advice Centre. She very much wanted to see the children and said that her husband had forbidden her to come near the house at Kintyre avenue. She wanted to know if she could see them now that they were in a children's home. Advised her there was no reason why she should not come and visit the children, but told her Mr. Good was having them out for the weekend (this weekend) and suggested she visit on Sunday of next weekend, 9th May. Mrs. Good agreed to do this.

4.5.71.

Visit to Carsewood House at 7.15 p.m. Saw Jacqueline, Samantha and Malcolm. The children were all washed and in their dressing gowns, ready for bed. Talked to them for sometime in the sitting room and asked them if their mother had been in touch. The children said no and I asked them how they felt about their Mummy coming to see them. All the children expressed a desire to see their mother but Samantha became very agitated and said "We'd better not let Dad hear as Dad said we weren't to have anything to do with her". Told the children this was nothing for them to worry about, if they wanted to see their mother she would call at the Home.

After the children went to bed, Miss Morrison informed me that when the father called on Saturday, in the first instance he did not call at 10 a.m. as he had stated but did not arrive until about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. When he arrived he was under the influence of drink and had a woman with him. Miss Morrison said they were later told by people in the village that as the couple had gone down to the bus stop, the woman who was carrying Malcolm fell down the steps, obviously very much under the influence of drink. Mr. Good is reported to have urinated against the bus stop and the village were apparently talking about the behaviour of this couple.

When the children were returned on the Sunday only Mr. Good came up to the house, but the woman was seen standing at the end of the road.

7.5.71.

I have called at the Good house-hold on three occasions this week in an effort to see Mr. Good to have the Family Allowance Book signed but have been unable to make contact with him. I left a note from this date advising him that he must contact me at the Family Advice Centre. I further informed him that if he called at Carsewood House again under the influence of drink he would not be allowed to have the children out.

6.30. Mr. Good phoned me at the Family Advice Centre, very indignant about my note. "What right had I to tell him what to do". I asked him to call at the Advice Centre to sign the Family Allowance Book. He informed me I had to go up to the house if I wanted to see him, he hadn't had his tea yet. This man is very offensive and seldom listens to what anyone else is saying. I pointed out that although he has been working for four weeks he has made no contribution at all to the children's maintenance and unless he did so the Family Allowance Book would be returned to the Department of Health & Social Security at Newcastle. He told me to hold onto the Book as he thought his job would be finished next week and he would have the kids back home again.

Advised him that this step would have to be discussed. He told me that there was going to be no discussion about it, he was having the children home and that was that.

10.5.71.

I was advised by Miss Cusick, Matron of Carsewood House, that Mrs. Good did not call on Sunday as arranged. She phoned with some explanation as to why she could not come. This has been the pattern in the past with Mrs. Good. She has on many occasions promised the children things and promised to take them places but has not kept to her word.

Visited the Good home at 6 p.m. No admittance. Left the Family Allowance Book with Mrs. McPhee next door, with the promise to get Mr. Good to sign the Book.

11.5.71

£5-60 received from Family Allowance and paid to maintenance.

...

19.5.71.

Visited Carsewood House and saw all children. They are beginning to settle into the routine of the Home and appear to be very happy. Father still visits every second weekend. He takes them out and takes them home to Kintyre Avenue, usually fills them with sweets etc. Miss Cusick reports that the next day they are often very sick. Charmaine says her father is working but when I asked her about the job she said she thought it was only for a short time and was very evasive about it. The children have all learnt to be as sly as their father.

15.7.71.

Over the past two months I have made several attempts to see Mr. Good. I have visited the home on several occasions but been unable to locate him. I have left notes asking him to call at the family Advice Centre, these he ignores.

Visited Carsewood House on this date and saw all children. I had my lunch with them and spent some time after discussing matters. They look forward to seeing their mother but still have the greatest affection for their father and keep wanting to know when they can return home.

30.7.71.

Mr. Good seen at the Family Advice Centre on this date. Yesterday I received a phone call from the Social Work Department Area Office, Johnstone, stating that Mr. Good had called there asking for confirmation that his children were in care and at Carsewood House. He had apparently gone to Social Security Offices asking for assistance and told them he was having the children home for the weekend and needed money. He had been advised that if he was given confirmation in writing that the children were coming home for the weekend, it was possible a payment would be made. I advised Mr. Barratt of the Johnstone Office that there was no need for Mr. Good to claim assistance for his children, they were being perfectly well looked after and fed at Carsewood House and if he wished them home for the weekend it was his responsibility to provide food for them. I have been advised that Mr. Good has been working as a bus driver over the past few weeks and only last Friday saw him in Moss Street, Paisley, under the influence of drink. Advised Mr. Barratt that Mr. Good should call and see me at the office.

When I saw him today he said he had used the children as an excuse to get money. I asked about the job and he said he had crashed the bus into a car last week and has lost his job. It rather sounds as if this had happened while he was under the influence of drink. So the man appears to be unemployed again. It is very difficult to pin him down to exactly when he is working and when he is drawing benefit. I would imagine he draws benefit all the time and takes casual jobs inbetween to get extra money for drinking. He was advised that unless he gets a steady job and contributes to his children's maintenance we must look at the situation and the possibility of boarding the children out. A letter was sent to him on the 27th stating these facts but he insists today that he did not receive any letter.

IM/BC

Visited Carswood House on this date and saw all the Good family. Charmaine is developing into a very nice big girl. She is obedient, happy natured and gives little trouble in the home. The other three girls all appear happy and content at Carswood House.

The children talk incessantly about their parents. Father is obviously the most popular. They inform me that he has gone off for a month to the Territorial Camp somewhere in England. Mother still visits periodically but does not appear to want to be very deeply involved. When Miss Cusick tried to speak to her regarding the future of the children, she very hurriedly said she would discuss this with the father or she would "tell him" as she put it. It would appear that these children will be long-term in care as neither parents are making any strenuous effort to set a home up for them. Mr. Good is insistent that he will be married whenever he can be divorced but this will obviously be a long time yet. The neighbours report this woman he is friendly with spends the weekend at the house, so it is obvious he is enjoying his leisure time and he will make no further plan to have the children returned to his home.

IM/BC

11.11.71

After making enquiries extensively with all agencies who may be able to supply information regarding the Good children a Report was sent off to Dr. Nelson on this date. Have not been able to obtain much more information than previously known. Checked with family doctor, health visitor for the area etc. but the pattern of the early stage of Malcol's childhood appear to be uneventful until after his second birthday. At that time the marital disputes in the home became excessive, and from then onwards it was a deterioration of family life.

Attended Case Conference at Carswood House on this date relating to the five Good children. The general consensus of opinion seemed to be that it would be detrimental to the children's interest to remove them from care or return them to their father's care at this stage.

Miss Cusick appeared to be concerned that when the children returned from a weekend at home they discussed the fact that they appeared to be supplied either with their father's consent or in his absence with strong drink. She asked me to impress on Mr. Good that the girls are much too young to be participating in drinking parties in the home. If they are obtaining strong liquor in the home without their parents' consent then it is equally his responsibility to see that this does not happen in the future.

Visited the home. Since Mr. Good has taken up with this woman 'Cathy' the home certainly appears to be much cleaner and tidier. The windows were washed and fresh curtains were up. The living room was fairly tidy and clean. I discussed with him the problem that Miss Cusick had brought up regarding the girls, but he was very indignant and denied that they were given access to any strong drink. Again warned him that the responsibility was his especially over the Christmas and New Year period.

Mr. Good called at the F.A.C. this afternoon and said he wanted the children home tonight in-stead of tomorrow. I pointed out that this was most inconvenient. When he wished the children home at any particular time he must advise the Matron in advance. It was pretty obvious he had been at the Clinic to see the doctor and only noticed me in passing. The idea occurred to him at that stage. I phoned Miss Cusick and she stated that it was not suitable for the children to be absent from the Home this evening as they were having a rehearsal for a play the children were doing for a concert next week. Advised Mr. Good that he must call tomorrow as usual to collect the children. Again warned him regarding the strong drink in the home, but he was most emphatic that this does not happen.

Attended the Children's Party at Carswood House. Saw and spoke to all children. The girls are pleasant, well dressed and well behaved.

It was a very pleasant evening. A splendid meal and the children really a credit to the Matron. The improvement in the girls' behaviour is very noticeable and they appear calm and happy in this atmosphere.

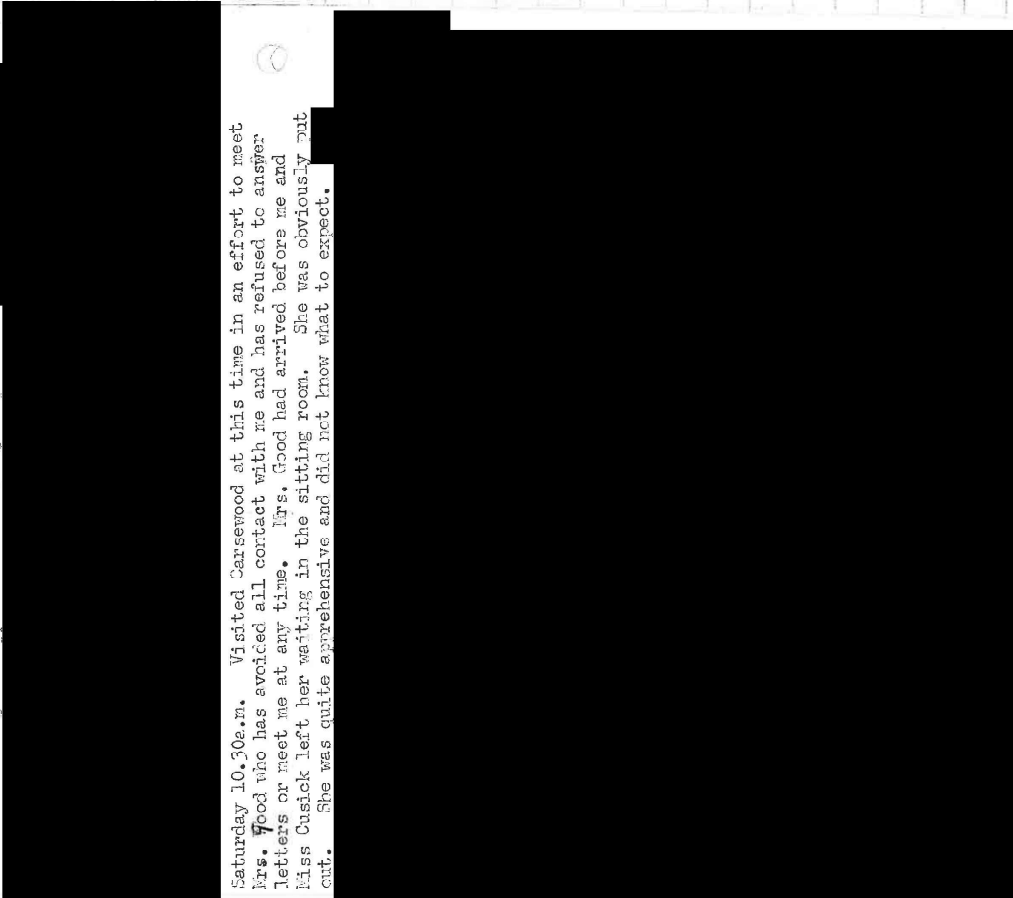

22.4.72

Saturday 10.30a.m. Visited Carsewood at this time in an effort to meet Mrs. Wood who has avoided all contact with me and has refused to answer letters or meet me at any time. Mrs. Good had arrived before me and Miss Cusick left her waiting in the sitting room. She was obviously not cut. She was quite apprehensive and did not know what to expect.



8.9.72

Home visit, house clean and fairly tidy. Mr. Good states he cannot get work, wants me to "fix it" with Sister Herdry, Welfare Officer Chrysler Ltd. to get his job back, advised him I have no influence in this direction.

28.9.72

Phone call from Mrs. Hollins S.S.H.A. are preparing to evict Mr. Good for rent arrears. He owes over £40. Mrs. Hollins advised me that Mr. Good has been working for almost a year but got sacked four weeks ago. During this period I have suspected he had a job of some kind as he is seldom in during the day, but he maintained he was still unemployed.

Advised Mrs. Hollins we had no strong wish to return the children to their father, as his patterns of living did not appear to have changed. He still drinks heavily, has a woman friend but states he will get married when his divorce is final.

0.11.72 Mr. Good called at the office. Asked if an eviction could be stopped. He has applied to S.S.A.F.A. for a grant. I doubt if he'll get it - he's had assistance from them in the past.

He has just got his driver's licence back - disqualification for drink offence - hopes to get a job.

Advised him I couldn't give any answer off hand, but would do so if he phoned tomorrow. He didn't phone, but Councillor Orr did before I'd established facts from Mrs. Mackay, whose case it is. Mrs. McKay advises that Mr. Good's eviction is not only because of rent arrears but also because of neighbours complaints of drinking parties. Mr. Good lost his last job through drinking. At a recent case conference in respect of the children who are in care, it was agreed that no major effort be taken to return them to father's care - which had been unsatisfactory before they were admitted, on account of their being left on their own and his drinking.

Advised Councillor Orr we would not intervene.

Letter sent to Mr. Good enclosing copy summons.

13.12.72 Visited Carsewood House 4.00 p.m. Saw all children. Girls making normal progress, [redacted]

14.12.72 Lunch at Carsewood 12.30 p.m. All children home. Girls as bright as ever. Malcolm not quite sure what is happening. [redacted]

2.12.72 Several visits to the family home, unable to contact father. Letter sent this date advising him of his obligation regarding maintenance, copy in file. J M.

8.12.72 Mr. Good at F.A.C. very abusive, shouting and swearing, says can't stop him seeing his children. Says he will see them when he wants to. Dr. Cunningham finally looked in room and waited until Good left.

9.1.73 Carsewood House 6.00 p.m. Had meal with all the children and staff, we were entertained after. All children relaxed and on good behaviour. Charmaine a good organiser and others quite willing to take part, Malcolm as usual hanging on wanting attention. J M.

6.1.73 Case review, Carsewood House. It was felt all children making normal progress, [redacted]

17.1.73

12.15 p.m. Visited Mrs. Good at 141 Raebury Street, Maryhill. When I knocked, a man answered, said Mrs. Good was at the shops, waited in close for her return. She is off work with flu, kept me standing at door in freezing cold, said she had visitors!

27.1.73

Malcolm at Mrs. Good's house for weekend, seemed to be uneventful.

19.2.73
