1. Reaction to present position Andrew continues to remain settled and accepting of his position. With occasional mumbling protests when rules or decisions don't suit him. Basically he functions at a acceptable level and development continues at a satisfactory standard. With Andrew well aware that he enjoys profoundly better standards than he would at home.
2. Attitude to staff His relationships with staff are fairly thin and superficial with a reluctance on Andrews part to allow a deeper involvement. I am very much aware of a barrier between us. He sees care staff as an unfortunate obstacle between himself and seniors, displaying an annoyed condescending attitude when reminded of his position or of basic good manners.
3. Relationships with other children He has no time for younger children shows his dislike for certain individuals openly by being rude and sarcastic. Very quick to slag anyone at the slightest opportunity, complains bitterly when the roles are reversed. Sees innuendo when none exists. Which to me betrays inward self conscious inferiority. Well accepted in his peer group although basically a loner.
4. Reaction to authority Accepts grudgingly especially from females but is never openly defiant. Shows by his attitude that he feels females are there to serve his needs. Dislikes carrying out basic routines. More accepting of male staff. But would still rather deal direct with seniors. This may be more indicative of Ann St in general or staff in particular than it is of Andrew.
5. Contact with and attitude to own family Sees mother regularly through her visits to Ann St or his visits home. The present level of contact would appear to adequately meet his needs and I feel it should continue at this level. Andrew remains very loyal and protective of mother. While Sarah shows more concern and interest for Andrew than he does for her.

6. Interests, hobbies, leisure activities

Mainly T.V or reading, Shows a token interest in football but prefers less energetic outlets such as pool or Video games.

7. Special needs or recommendations (physiological, vocational, educational, etc)

Andrew will not accept anyone as a substitute for his mother but is in need of an adult relationship that he can come to terms with on an intellectual level. Since I feel that his needs in this area require stimulation and development. Hopefully this can be incorporated through staff interaction.

Andrew is a normal healthy boy who suffers from nothing more than the occasional cold. He is developing physically at an appropriate adolescent rate.

Varies with his mood. Andrew can be loudmouthed and cheeky at times, but is usually pleasant company and good-humoured.

Summary of Discussion + Goals/Tasks for the Future (Goals to be listed separately)

Andrew and Sarah were last the subject of Review at Ann Street Children's Home on 11th October 1982. On that date, the following recommendations were made.

- (a) Both Sarah and Andrew continue to reside within Ann Street Children's Home.
- (b) Parental Rights action be instigated, as per the decision arrived at within Area 2.
- (c) The children's contact with mother remain as at present.
- (d) Mr Titterington clarify the situation re Play Therapy and relate same to both residential and educational staff.
- (e) There continue to be ongoing liaison between all interested parties.
- (f) The situation next be reviewed at Ann Street Children's Home at 10.30a.m. on 23rd February 1983.

As agreed, Sarah and Andrew have continued to reside at Ann Street Children's Home. Since the last Review, submission for the assumption of Parental Rights has been made, and it is thought that this will be presented at the next Social Work Sub-Committee Meeting on 8th March 1983. Contact with mother has continued as before, with Sarah going to see her mother on Saturday afternoons between 2 and 5 p.m. (much of their time being spent in the Dens Road Market). Mother also visits Ann Street on Tuesday nights for approximately one hour between 6 and 7 p.m. Sarah looks forward to these visits but such contact is felt to be sufficient for Sarah. During Miss Mills' visits to Ann Street she makes conversation with staff enquiring as to how the children have been behaving, and plays well with Sarah.

Some concern was expressed by the group as to little feed-back being derived from Play Therapy.

Over the last week or so, Mr Titterington has been concerned about what has been happening in Miss Mills' house. It is believed that a [REDACTED] is staying in the house. Sarah has told her mother that if [REDACTED] is in the house she will not visit. The home situation, at present, is very unstable, and Mr Titterington suggested that contact should take place at Ann Street Children's Home, as he feels there is a moral danger to Sarah. In order to safeguard Sarah, Mr Titterington intends discussing, -

the situation with Miss Mills, plus a careful monitoring of all contact. In Mr Ramsay's contact with mother, he would carry out a likewise exercise.

At this stage, Mr McDonnough took his leave - he had only been gone a matter of minutes when Dr Morton and Miss Sheritt joined the group.

Andrew :

Within Ann Street Children's Home, Andrew is considered as a boy of "moods" - he can be very high one day and the next, very low. He is very anxious for more contact with mother and as reported on other occasions, has never fully accepted Ann Street as "home". He endeavours to see his mother every lunch time (following school meals) and continues to see her every Saturday and Sunday. He has recently asked if he can stay overnight between Saturday and Sunday.

Andrew is in the same Unit in Ann Street as Sarah and has a room of his own. At this point in time, he is extremely anxious re the possible assumption of Parental Rights and cannot understand why the Local Authority should wish to take this action as he is now 13 years of age. Both residential staff and fieldworker have attempted (and will continue) to allay Andrew's fears. Of late, Andrew's school work has deteriorated and his general attitude has regressed, this being the general feeling of residential staff and not reported by the school. He is still very much a "loner".

Leisurewise, Andrew is involved in Badminton, playing football and swimming. There are no problems with health.

Recommendations :

- (a) Both children continue to reside within Ann Street Children's Home.
- (b) Family contact continue to be encouraged but monitored for reasons as aforestated.
- (c) Andrew be involved in discussion re the various stages of Parental Rights assumption.
- (d) Mr Titterington discuss the possibility of a befriender with Area 2's Homefinder, solely for Sarah Jane.

- (e) Dr Morton contact Sarah's teacher, Mr McDonnough, Rosebank Primary School, re the Play Therapy situation.
- (f) Next Review to be held at Ann Street Children's Home on Wednesday 15th June 1983 at 10.30 a.m.

Pen Picture:

Andrew is a smallish boy with brown hair. He is well established and confident about being in Ann Street and continues to maintain steady progress. He can be a cheeky boy at times but on the whole he is seen as being popular and well liked. He is still close to his mother and he enjoys his visits home, no doubt because of getting more freedom. He has normal interests of a 13- year old and enjoys playing football.

Summary of Work:

I try to see Andrew about once a fortnight but there is as much work with other aspects of his case. The main development is that the request for parental rights have been submitted but have not yet gone to Committee. Andrew has been fully briefed and is aware of what it entails.

Suitability of Placement:

Andrew continues to do well at Ann Street. He benefits from the support given by the staff and unless circumstances change it is likely he will remain there until he is sixteen.

School Report:

Andrew's work is improving. His attendance is perfect. He is below average but tries hard.

Health:/

Health:

Andrew remains in good health.

Contact with mother:

Andrew visits his mother on a Saturday and Sunday and goes for tea every second Thursday. His mother visits every Tuesday. She accepts parental rights provided she does not lose contact with the children. Miss Mill still has her steady boyfriend, although this affair blows hot and cold. There are signs she is involved with other men.

Parental Contributions:

No contributions are paid.

Future Action:

If the previous recommendations all have been carried out, given the current home situation I would suggest that the position concerning Andrew remain unaltered. Some thought has gone into possible overnight stays but this, I do not think, is advisable given the uncertain nature of who is staying with Miss Mill.

Since the last review, there has been little of consequence to significantly affect Andrew in his continued state of reasonable settlement at Ann Street, albeit rather grudgingly and with no great enthusiasm.

During the interim period since the last review, Andrew has moved to another unit of mixed sexes and varying age groups along with his sister Sarah. To date it does not appear to have had any adverse effect upon him, nor has it proved a profound stimulus either. His sister Sarah does appear to have gained considerably in maturity and independence since the move.

Within the peer group, Andrew is an accepted member, although not popular with everyone. His interaction is at a fairly basic and superficial level with no specific relationships and a preference to.

identify with the more militant hierarchy, Andrew does more than his share of "slagging" and niggling which passes on some occasions as humorous banter. It also helps to disguise basic inferiority in articulated communication. He shows little patience for younger children (except Sarah) and is not beyond bullying them. He involves himself in most inhouse activities mainly pool, table tennis and television, outside activities include swimming and badminton. He shows no more than a token interest in football, using it mainly to retain a place in the peer group who are obsessed by it.

Relationships with staff are fairly shallow with a perceptive barrier that doesn't allow anyone to get too near. He is variously described as likeable pleasant and obliging by some staff, while others find him aloof, sullen and unhelpful. An indication that he has different faces for different people. The truth is probably somewhere between both extremes.

Andrew continues to attend Kirkton High School. He is equally reticent in attitude and communication about school. There have been no adverse reports from school and we assume he is performing at a satisfactory if unspectacular level. His latest marks have in fact shown a slight improvement that seemed to please him.

Family contact is being maintained on a regular basis. Mother visits once per week occasionally with "Uncles" and the children have weekly day leaves. There is little feed back from Andrew regarding home conditions or what he does while at home. It is noticeable when mother visits Andrew tends to show off and act the big man, while Sarah is as high as the proverbial kite.

It would appear that Andrew will remain

with us for some considerable time. He is managing to cope with the situation with no conspicuous problems, allowing us merely to cater for his basic needs, while his thoughts are very much centred on a return home. It is therefore probably unrealistic to suppose we will ever achieve anything more.

Since the last review Andrew has settled well in a room of his own which he keeps very tidy. He remains accepting of his present position and understands that there is no alternative meantime, also he was quite unperturbed when told what a Section 16 would mean to him. Andrew functions at an acceptable level and is aware that he enjoys better standards at Ann Street than he could expect at home.

Andrew relates well to Staff on the whole although in a thin and superficial way. He can converse easily and with humour, and is usually pleasant and good natured, but can be loud mouthed and cheeky, dependant on his mood. Andrew is very reluctant to form a close relationship to any care staff member as he sees us as an obstacle (unnecessary) between himself and Senior Staff, and is not too keen on being reminded of his position or of basic good manners.

Andrew mixes and is accepted quite well with his peer group although often shows a tendency to be a loner. He easily irritated by younger children and is quick to slag anyone at the slightest opportunity, but complains bitterly when roles are reversed.

Andrew is more accepting of male authority than he is of females, who he sees as being there to serve his needs.

He will do as he is asked, but will question even if he doesn't approve or agree, and if unhappy with the he will go straight to the Senior on duty with whom would rather deal with any way.

Andrew sees mum regularly through her visits to Ann Street and his own visits home. He remains loyal and protective towards mum and the present level of contact seems adequate meantime. He does not show quite as much interest or concern in Swah as she does for him, but when necessary, ^{will} be very protective towards her. He has minimal contact with his older sister - Christine - when he visits home, but conversation about her is usually limited to criticism of her when she has caused trouble or upset mum.

Andrew is normally quite healthy, suffering from the occasional cold, and is seen as developing physically at a normal rate.

He enjoys mainly less strenuous activities such as watching T.V., reading, video games and pool. Very taken at the moment with a new 8 track tape deck acquired from Auntie, and he also shows an interest in world records and facts. On the more physical side he will play the occasional game of foot ball, and badminton at school.

Staff see Andrew's conduct as being good to fair, his industry as adequate to show and his manners as ~~fair~~ fair to good. His temper is seen as ranging through a few recognised headings, i.e., good, even, resentful, moody, sulky and quick. His leadership qualities come over as uncertain, mainly, presumably due to his periods of independence.

Andrew is seen as fairly well adjusted in most spheres. He will not accept anyone as a substitute for his mum, but is seen as in need of an adult-relationship that he can come to terms with on an intellectual level.

It is felt that thoughts on Andrew's future should be considered and discussed. He is now in an O level class and has hopes of passing his exams although staff feel he may be setting his sights too high.

Andrew shows up best in one to one or small group situations, as when in the larger group he appears to feel that he has to perform to certain levels to gain acceptance to that group. He is very capable of switching off from the peer group to pursue his "own thing" and is considered reasonably well adjusted considering his background. He has given up smoking and is aware of the dangers of glue sniffing, so it is felt he is not at risk of being involved in this when he comes in contact with Christine or his friends when he visits home.

We see Andrew as remaining with us for quite some time.
